ECON 2302 Principles of Microeconomics Summer II Term (ONLINE)

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I. <u>Textbook:</u> *Principles of Economics*. By Greenlaw, Steven and Taylor, Timothy. Houston, TX: OpenStax College, March 2017.

- II. <u>Prerequisites:</u> None. However, college algebra is <u>strongly encouraged</u>.
- III. <u>Course Description:</u> An analysis of the economy as a whole including measurement and determination of Aggregate Demand and Aggregate Supply, national income, inflation, and unemployment. Other topics include international trade, economic growth, business cycles, and fiscal policy and monetary policy.
- IV. <u>Purpose of the Course</u>: Economics 2301, as taught at South Plains College, serves as a core component for Social and Behavior Sciences and is a required course for Bachelor of Business Administration (B.B.A.) degrees.

V. <u>Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs):</u>

- 1. Explain the role of scarcity, specialization, opportunity cost and cost/benefit analysis in economic decision-making.
- 2. Identify the determinants of supply and demand; demonstrate the impact of shifts in both market supply and demand curves on equilibrium price and output.
- 3. Summarize the Law of Diminishing Marginal Utility; describe the process of utility maximization.
- 4. Calculate supply and identify the determinants of price elasticity of demand and supply.
- 5. Describe the production function and the Law of Diminishing Marginal Productivity; calculate and graph short-run and long-run costs of production.
- 6. Identify the four market structures by characteristics; calculate and graph the profit maximizing price and quantity in the output markets by use of marginal analysis.
- 7. Determine the profit maximizing price and quantity of resources in factor markets under perfect and imperfect competition by use of marginal analysis.
- 8. Describe governmental efforts to address market failure such as monopoly power, externalities, and public goods.
- 9. Identify the benefits of free trade using the concept of comparative advantage.
- 10. Address current policies, public views, expectations, environmental, and cultural changes.
