HISTORY 1301 Mr. WEST COURSE SYLLABUS

HISTORY OF THE U.S. FROM PRE-COLONIAL TIMES TO 1877

Required Text: Land of Hope: An Invitation to the Great American Story. Wilfred M. McClay Scripture: Daniel 2:21. "It is He who changes the times and epochs: He removes kings and establishes kings; He gives wisdom to wise men and knowledge to men of understanding." Course Purpose: To acquaint students with the panorama of American history, and to promote critical thinking in interrelating the past to the present. The course promotes an understanding of a body of knowledge that any American citizen should possess about the history of his own country.

Course Description: This course is a survey of American history which is intended to help the student to become a responsible citizen of the United States by instilling a sense of pride in our nation and gaining a deeper understanding of the core principles of the founding fathers. These will also include the virtues of courage, honor, moderation, and prudence; examples of which can be seen in our founding fathers.

Course Requirements:

- 1. There will be 9 basic grades, 4-7 intermediate grades, and 2-4 major grades given in each of the four parts of the course.
- 2. We will have short writing assignments analyzing primary source documents.
- 3. You will have outside readings covering the various topics in U.S. history.
- 4. You will read the textbook.
- 5. We will have quizzes over the readings, lectures, presentations, and the textbook.
- 6. WE will have discussions over the reading materials and the assigned textbook.
- 7. We will have exams covering the four segments of the course.
- 8. Homework: Homework will consist of short reading and writing assignments
- 9. Grading: We will have exams over the four segments of the course at a rate of one or two exams per segment. Exams may consist of 20-30 questions: Multiple choices, True-False, and Matching. There will be six short answer questions, answer three. There will be two essay questions, answer only one. Exams will count 45% of the class grade. Quizzes will count 35% of the class grade. Homework/Discussion/Daily Work will count 20% of the class grade. Homework is due on the date assigned. Points will be deducted for each day late. Short writing assignments are completed in class and counted as a daily grade.
